Dr Yang worked at the University of Auckland from 1999 to November 2011 when he was elected as a Member of Parliament in the general election. As an academic, Dr Yang's main research areas included Chinese foreign policy, international relations in Asia Pacific and Chinese politics.

Dr Yang was also Associate Dean of the Arts Faculty at the University of Auckland, Director of China Studies Centre in New Zealand Asia Institute and Chairman of the Auckland branch of New Zealand Institute of International Affairs.

Dr Yang was Deputy Chair of the Health Select Committee and a member of the Commerce Select Committee in the 50th Parliament (2011-2014). In the 51st Parliament (2014-2017), Dr Yang chaired the Education and Science Select Committee. He also chaired the Parliamentary China Friendship Group and Hong Kong Friendship Group. Dr Yang was re-elected at the September 2017 General Election.

Dr Yang is a member of the New Zealand China Council's Advisory Board and Chairman Emeritus of the Auckland branch of New Zealand Institute of International Affairs.



Over the past five years, Sam has worked in 13 countries with various youth groups, non-profits and UN agencies to mobilise young people and create disaster resilient communities.

He co-founded WeVisit in 2016, a social enterprise that bridges generations by linking young people with socially isolated elderly. Sam attended the New Zealand China Young Leaders Forum in Beijing, China, as part of the Minister for Youth's International Leadership Award delegation in 2016.
